



We have reserved a full page in each edition for your emails and letters. Sometimes we need to run to two pages, which is even better.





Hi all, I'm hoping someone can help with a petrol tank



Out of Town Editor's Nephew Visits Haynes Motor Museum


Mark Gerrand, with wife Carmel, were in the UK recently and visited the Haynes Motor Museum.

Technical Measuring Crankshaft Oil Clearance



Oil clearance inside an engine is critical. Just a few thousandths of an inch can cause a damaged bearing or seized shaft or low oil pressure and is very likely to cause major engine failure.

There are several ways to measure oil clearance. If you have experience with a micrometer, good eye sight or would like a challenge - do the measurement method, but there is also a simpler method requiring no special equipment or skills – Flexigauge.

The measurement method involves assembling the bearing in the housing, tightening the bolts and then using an inside micrometer to measure the inside diameter known as tunnel size. Now measure the shaft with an external micrometer. Subtract the shaft size from the housing size and you should have a clearance of around .001" to .002". If you don't get this clearance you will need to read next month's technical article.

The other method involves purchasing some ACL Flexigauge from an auto parts supplier – see photo below.



To use, assemble the bearings and crankshaft dry, that is with no oil. Place the Flexigauge on the top of the crank journal before fitting bearing caps – see below.

Tighten the bearing caps down and <u>do not rotate</u> <u>shaft</u>. Remove bearing caps and the Flexigauge should have squashed down. Then use the packaging to measure the oil clearance – see photo below. In this case it is .002".



If the product has not flattened down at all or flattened too much (disappeared) the oil clearance is well outside the spec and will require further work – see next article.

If oil clearance is as desired, clean off Flexigauge and lift out crank. Next add oil or assembly lube to bearings and refit bearing caps and tighten bolts. The crank should now rotate smoothly with a slight drag. If not see next article.

Next article – (no prizes for guessing) Crankshaft bearing problem solving


